



COVID-19 and the Project

- During these unprecedented times, Wataynikaneyap Power LP ("Wataynikaneyap Power") is entering into the construction phase to build critical infrastructure to connect remote First Nation communities to the electricity grid (the "Project").
- The objective of Wataynikaneyap Power is to continue with aspects of the Project that limit the risk to health and safety, to keep the Project on time and on budget, and to protect shareholder equity.
- Wataynikaneyap Power is focused on the health and safety of its employees, partners, contractors, member First Nation communities and the general public.
- Wataynikaneyap Power follows the most upto-date medical advice provided by the federal and provincial government in its own measures to help limit the spread of COVID-19.

Education, Training and Capacity Building

Valard will be working with communities to address training gaps with job-specific training for the following roles: labourers, lattice labourers, survey assistants, environmental monitors, engineering technologists.

Training and COVID-19 – We are Adapting!!!

There has been a lot of uncertainty around training in light of COVID-19 and keeping everybody healthy. In July, Opiikapawiin hosted two Webex sessions with accepted applicants to the Ground Crew Line Support training program. These sessions included representatives from the Infrastructure, Health and Safety Association and provided an opportunity for trainees to learn more about the program and each other (including the trainers). The focus was to provide updates on COVID considerations associated with training and to make sure participants questions were answered before in-person training began.

Opiikapawiin has developed a COVID-19 Pandemic Preparedness Plan to protect the health and safety of trainees participating in training programs. The plan provides details on how training can safely resume with trainees leaving the communities and returning when they have completed the training. Contact Laura Calmwind for further details.

Ganawenjigewin Environmental Protection Training

This four-week land-based training program put on by Opiikapawiin will run in the fall of 2020. The program will include daily outdoor activities, teachings from the land, and learning circles to prepare students to take part in Indigenous-led environmental monitoring. Trainees will learn:

- Indigenous Environmental Practices How Indigenous Peoples take care of the Land
- Western Science Environmental Knowledge Western Science Approach to **Environment Protection**
- How the two systems of knowledge can be used to help protect the environment.






BUT WHAT IF I DON'T HAVE A RESUMÉ ?!?

Business Readiness and Procurement of Goods and Services

Numerous Indigenous businesses exist that are owned and operated in the 24 First Nations. Opiikapawiin maintains a business registry and helps the EPC contractor Valard to identify new businesses, identify gaps in business, overcome barriers, and engage when required.

Valard will procure goods and services from Participating First Nations for the following work where capacity and scope can be successfully achieved by the business. These items are sometimes referred to as "set-asides". Where new set-aside businesses from the Participating First Nations are established, Valard is expected to transition the work from the non-Participating First Nations businesses.

- Access road construction and maintenance (e.g. aggregates and matting)
- Camp set up and management
- Catering and food services
- · Clearing and grubbing
- Environmental monitoring
- Equipment rentals

- Local knowledge holders
- Training
- Transportation services, such as helicopters and charters
- Security
- Storage facility rental
- Surveying

Raising Awareness About the Project – Sachigo Lake First Nation Community Contest Results!


In July, Sachigo Lake First Nation's Community Liaison Ellen Tait hosted a contest for the youth in her community. The challenges were as follows:

- Grade 1 and younger: Draw and color two wooden poles connected with a transmission line
- Grade 2-4: Draw and color a steel pole and wooden pole connected with transmission line
- Grade 5-8: Make a steel pole, wooden pole and substation connected together
