Valard Training

Participating First Nations members working on the project will complete various training programs at the worksite. The type of training required depends on the work activities. More details are provided during the hiring process. As of December 31, 2020, Valard has provided 3,012.25 hours of training to Participating First Nation employees in a

variety of areas including for example:

- Safety, Site and General Orientation
- Electrical and Hydraulic Safety Awareness
- First Aid (Standard and Emergency)
- Working at Heights
- Basic Rigging and Hoisting
- Mobile Crane Operation (0-8 ton) •

- Poletop Rescue
- **Chainsaw Safety Awareness**
- Alcohol and Drug Awareness
- Powered Mobile Equipment, Aerial/Elevated Work Platform
- Telecom Work Zone Traffic Control and Safety
- **Traffic Control Person**
- **Cultural Awareness**

Ganawenjigewin Environmental Protection Training Program



Wataynikaneyap and Opiikapawiin Services are proud to have developed and delivered a four-week Ganawenjigewin Environmental Protection Training Program in November and December of 2020.

The training's unique approach combines traditional land-based Indigenous knowledge with western science to teach and prepare participants for environmental management employment opportunities on the Wataynikaneyap Transmission Project.

On December 11 the twelve participants successfully completed their training. They will be part of the next generation of Environmental Stewards to protect and care for the land, both during and after the project. Milgwetch for all of your hard work!!

With the knowledge carried and shared by Elders and traditional knowledge keepers of the Participating First Nations and area, trainees took part in a combination of classroom learning, traditional ceremonies, and land-based exercises during the first three weeks. For the final week, Opiikapawiin partnered with Valard to deliver the specialized Environmental Monitor training that Valard provides to their staff.

Opiikapawiin adapted its delivery due to the COVID-19 pandemic by holding training at the Quetico Conference Centre 1.5 hours outside of Thunder Bay, reducing exposure of trainees to others. COVID safety protocols were in place including taking traditional medicine prepared by Elders daily. This allowed trainees to focus on learning. Classroom presentations moved to online video conferencing with limited instructors joining outdoor activities.






- seeking candidates to sit on an Environmental Committee.





Fast-forward to 2020 and "TKG CF ROWC LP" was created to subcontract to Valard to complete clearing activities and preliminary access construction on the Wataynikaneyap transmission line project.

Centerfire Energy Group has been subcontracted to perform clearing activities and preliminary access construction on the northern section of Group 2 (see map on page 12).

Our most important goals on this project are:

- To maintain a strong safety culture to ensure nobody gets hurt;
- To respect and remain world-class stewards to the environment we are working in; and
- To achieve a high-level of local participation from the participating First Nation communities

We are preparing to ramp-up operations toward the later part of January, or when the winter road allows for heavy traffic.

Centerfire and TKG will continue to work in a respectful manner through various communities as we support the project through to completion.
