















# Substation Construction Progress (% complete as of April 3, 2021)

After that, I applied for and was hired as the Indigenous Recruitment and Retention Advisor.

In this role, I liaise between First Nations and Contractors on employment opportunities and employee relations issues; communicate employee prerequisites for construction jobs; identify skill shortages and implement training supports to address them; and chair the Opiikapawiin Human Resources Committee.

I have been in this role since May 2019 and have been enjoying my job ever since which is a lot of work! I have always been passionate about helping our First Nation people and improving our situations on Turtle Island. Those that know me know I'm always ready to help. My educational background and work experience includes the fields of Education, Management, and Human Resources.

Although I look forward to the day that the north is energized, this journey that we are all on is what is exciting. Many of our First Nations members are building Wataynikaneyap, and we at Opiikapawiin are here to provide support services for anyone interested in becoming a part of the Project. 

## Education, Training and Capacity Building

#### **TRAINING AND COVID 19**

Opiikapawiin has developed a COVID-19 Pandemic Preparedness Plan to protect the health and safety of trainees participating in training programs. #### ALL – WOMEN LINE CREW GROUND SUPPORT TRAINING

Line Crew Ground Support (LCGS) is a certificate course that includes climbing at heights, operating equipment, classroom learning and training outdoors. The program is specifically designed with 25 certified courses that will prepare participants to work on a powerline construction ground crew and apply for apprenticeships.

After offering five LCGS courses, an all-women course is being offered for 14 weeks planned for the Fall of 2021 to encourage women to join the powerline work crews.

- Travel, accommodations, meal allowance and training stipend are included
- Mentorship and additional supports are available during training. Workshops could include Personal Health and Family **Indigenous** Safety, Care, Women's Health and Wellness, and Impacts of Intergenerational Trauma.
- Valid G driver's license and Grade 12/GED are an asset but not mandatory
- ➤ Must be age 18+

Based out of Kenora, MCL has been working throughout Northwestern Ontario for over 50 years and has grown to employ close to 100 year-round personnel with up to 200 seasonal workers.

MCL supports its partners by offering employment opportunities to community members beyond the scope of the Wataynikenayap Power Project and expanding to our wide variety of regional projects. We offer hands-on training and mentoring, allowing employees to expand their skillsets and learn from our experienced core group of individuals.

During 2020 and 2021 to date, MCL and its partners have been subcontracted by Valard to undertake substation civil works at the Pickle Lake and Pipestone sites, various sections of right-of-way clearing works (over 200 km), tower and anchor foundation installation (earth and rock), and access trail construction and maintenance. Our work for the Wayatnikenayap Power Project covers an expansive area, including line segments AB, BC, CJ, and PQ to date. Future work on the Wataynikenayap Power Project will include aggregate production, additional substation civil works, and continuing with clearing and foundation works.




