














North Caribou Lake First Nation Camp Manager



- ThawiKayhiGan-Horizon is pleased to welcome you to the camp at Kingfisher Lake.



A helicopter picks up a stringing rope from a line stringing crew. The first step in stringing is to pull a rope through the travelers (temporary pulleys that are hanging from the structure). Then a conductor (line that carries electricity) gets attached to the end of the rope and pulled through. This way the conductor never touches the ground, where it could be damaged and cause future issues.



Stringing crew workers often get picked up by helicopter after attaching travellers (that wheel that allows ropes, then cables to be pulled through from one structure to the next). The first thing they need to do is connect a safety line to the helicopter before stepping on.

Did you know?



There have been over 14 years of ongoing engagement to finalize the Wataynikaneyap Transmission Line Project plan.



- Wataynikaneyap (originally known as CCEG) was given the mandate by 13 Chiefs in October 2008 to pursue the planning and development of an electrical transmission line, owned by the communities, to connect 10 communities (now grown to 17) to the provincial electricity grid.
- The Wataynikaneyap Transmission Line is majority owned by 24
 First Nations it is a community-led Project that only advances
 under the Guiding Principles provided by leadership and
 supported by our partners Fortis Inc. and other private investors.


