

Herman Nelson heaters ready to be flown to where they are needed (December 2022).

When concrete foundations are poured, they need to be heated for several days for proper curing. The crew will tent the foundation and run a chute from the Herman Nelson to the foundation. They also tent and heat the ground before the pour to ensure no ice will affect the concrete.





Slug anchor materials parked onsite. Slug anchors are used to anchor transmission towers to the ground. They are assembled with the anchor perpendicular to the still pipe, then buried with the top of the anchor exposed. The guy plates to the left will be attached to the end of the anchor. A guy wire from a tangent tower is then fastened to the guy plate to support the tower. (September 2022)



This is a tower laying on its side, rigged for installation. It is ready to be lifted by helicopter and flown to its foundation (September 2022).

On the line between Red Lake and Pikangikum First Nation, Powerline Technicians use special insulated tools to installs protective grounds before working on the circuit. Note the glass electrical insulators. The insulators form an insulated barrier between the energized parts of an electric circuit and the towers. (September 2022).



At Pipestone Substation (C) the substation's equipment is kept within a locked and fenced compound. The 115 kV wires are held high above the ground as an extra means of preventing animals or humans from accidentally touching them.










At Pipestone Substation (C), a worker completes the wiring on a motorized switch. This switch will be controlled remotely once in operation.



Poles, wire, Radial Boom Derrick (RBD) trucks and other equipment have been delivered during this winter road season to the communities we are planning to soon serve.




What changes after Grid **Connection?**


