Wataynikaneyap, Opiikapawiin, Valard (the Project's Engineering, Procurement and Construction contractor), and Powertel, a subsidiary of Cormorant Services (the Project Inspection, Maintenance, and Emergency Response Contractor) are working together to maximize Indigenous Participation on the Wataynikaneyap Transmission Line Project.

- Communication





### McDowell Lake First Nation - March 13, 2024



Wataynikaneyap and OSLP offer a Chief's Orientation and Project overview to all newly appointed Chiefs to ensure they are up to date and informed on important Project matters.









### Plugged Into a Brighter Future

Opiikapawiin, in partnership with the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO), Natural Resources Canada (NRCAN), and Relay Education have developed Plugged In to a Brighter Future workshops to bring education about the energy sector and renewable energy to youth ages 9-14. Youth will be better prepared for careers in the energy sector as their communities connect to the provincial grid, and also ensures future generations understand the significance of First Nations Ownership in Wataynikaneyap Power.


