

Heavy equipment parked at the Keewaywin yard in April 2023.




In March 2023, a helicopter longlines gear between Knox camp and Sandy Lake First Nation. "Longlining" is transporting material or equipment via helicopter using a long cable.

A tractor is dragging tires along an access trail to drive frost deeper into the ground in March 2023. Increasing traffic along relatively bare ground increases the rate of frost penetrating the subsoil. A deep layer of frozen soil improves the access along the ROW and access trails.

Battery testing at Wawakapewin Substation (K) in April.


Batteries are used to power the control buildings at substations in case of a power outage. They provide approximately eight hours of power. Batteries are inspected and tested four times per year.


CONGRATULATIONS & BEST OF LUCK IN YOUR APPRENTICESHIPS!

My name is Trey Duncan, currently I work with Wataynikaneyap Power PM as a full-time Office Assistant in the Project Controls Department. I have been working on the Project for a total of 10 months, with a prior role as an HR summer student working in the Human Resources department. I was also a Bursary and Mentorship program recipient in 2022, and recently graduated from the 3-year Human Resources / Business Administration program at Confederation College this past April.

For the most part my day-to-day tasks are administrative related. To sum up my role: it is to help gather, collect, and distribute crucial information regarding the project. A lot must deal with what is going on from a Construction, Electrical, Engineering, and Substation perspective. Scheduling, Agenda, Attendance, and Minutes are all part of the meeting process. To name a few others: working on Visa statements, spending reports, filing away reports and other documents, and other small scale administrative tasks.

My favourite moments working on the project so far have been travelling to the communities to participate in career fairs. It's always great to engage with the youth in the communities, as well as getting to know the workers, Elders, and other companies that are involved! Another memorable moment was the career fair turnout at Dennis Franklin Cromarty high school in Thunder Bay back in March. The more students there are, the more it allows for the opportunity to provide a valuable experience.

I believe that my interest in helping others and learning more about the northern communities helps me in my role, however one of the main challenges I've had while working on the Project has been trying to make an impact on the younger ones when it comes to visiting the communities and partaking in career fairs. Especially grades 1-6, it can be hard to get their thoughts orientated in a manner that allows them to think about their future.

Another challenge I have faced is when I am in meetings, keeping up with all the engineering, powerline, substation, construction work is quite complex! However I'd like to share a quote with you by Carl Jung:

"Knowledge rests not upon truth alone, but upon error also" - Carl G. Jung.

This quote is from Carl Jung and is a great reminder that learning and growth often come from making mistakes and encountering challenges, rather than simply being right all the time.

Currently I work with Hydro One as a Powerline Apprentice, however I started my career with Valard in November 2019 as an Assembler. Shortly after getting my apprenticeship from CUSW for Powerline in October 2020, I then moved onto Stringing on the Wataynikaneyap Project.

Being part of the Valard team, and the confidence and capability that they had to do the linework, rubbed off on me and is something I continue to carry with me as I move forward in my career. This mindset helped make the initial learning curve more manageable, and the accumulation of experience from working at Valard was very beneficial.

One of the things that inspired me the most about this Project is its scope of work - no two days were the same! I always wondered what my day would look like, as transmission line work involves such a wide variety of tasks. One of my most fond memories of working on the Project, however, was climbing a tower for the first time. A wide variety of people from all corners of Canada also come to work on the Project (something that has been both a positive and challenging aspect).

While my current and former apprenticeships both offered a different learning experience for me, in the end this employment has helped me accomplish many things - most of all more knowledge and experience in this line of work, which was the biggest motivator for me on the ladder to success! I have found that if you are willing to put in the work, they will hire.

Along with this "can do" mindset, taking Opiikapawiin Services' LP Line Crew Ground Support Training has also benefited me on my journey, especially in my current apprenticeship. The benefits that this career provides my family with has also been a motivator.
